

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

Kindred, Fledgling, **Collected Stories**

Gerry Canavan & Nisi Shawl, editors

An original and eerily prophetic writer, Octavia E. Butler used the conventions of science fiction to explore the dangerous legacy of racism in America in harrowingly personal terms. She broke new ground with books that featured complex Black female protagonists—"I wrote myself in," she would later recall establishing herself as one of the pioneers of the Afrofuturist aesthetic. In 1995 she became the first science fiction writer to receive a MacArthur Fellowship, in recognition of her achievement in creating new aspirations for the genre and for American literature.

This first volume in the Library of America edition of Butler's collected works opens with her masterpiece, Kindred, one of the landmark American novels of the last half-century. Its heroine, Dana, a Black woman, is pulled back and forth between the present and the pre-Civil War past, where she finds herself enslaved on the plantation of a white ancestor whose life she must save to preserve her own. In Fledgling, an amnesiac discovers that she is a vampire, with a difference: she is a new, experimental birth with brown skin, giving her the fearful ability to go out in sunlight. Rounding out the volume are eight short stories and five essays including two never before collected—plus a newly researched chronology of Butler's life and career and helpful explanatory notes prepared by scholar Gerry Canavan. Butler's friend, the writer and editor Nisi Shawl, provides an introduction.

His first monograph, Octavia E. Butler, appeared in 2016 in the Modern Masters of Science Fiction series at University of Illinois Press.

Butler Scholars (2013) and coedited Strange Matings: Science Fiction, Feminism, African American Voices, and Octavia E. Butler (2013).



When Betty Friedan published The Feminine Mystique in 1963, the book exploded into women's consciousness. Before the decade was out, what had begun as a campaign for women's civil rights transformed into a diverse and revolutionary movement for freedom and social justice that challenged many aspects of everyday life long accepted as fixed: work, birth control and abortion, childcare and housework, gender, class, and race, art and literature, sexuality and identity, rape and domestic violence, sexual harassment, pornography, and more. This was the women's liberation movement, and writing—powerful, personal, and prophetic—was its beating heart. Fifty years on, in the age of #MeToo and Black Lives Matter, activists and writers Alix Kates Shulman and Honor Moore have gathered an unprecedented collection of works many long out-of-print and hard to find—that catalyzed and propelled the movement, visionary and radical writing as relevant and urgently needed as ever, ready to inspire a new generation of feminists.

Novels 1978-1984

This third volume in Library of America's fivevolume edition of John Updike's selected novels brings together one of his great masterpieces, Rabbit Is Rich, winner of the Pulitzer Prize, the National Book Award, and the National Book Critics Circle Award, and two wickedly funny novels that capture the changed realms of sex, politics, and family in the aftermath of the 1960s. In The Coup, the impoverished African nation of Kush is the stage for a withering takedown of an array of targets, from American materialism and its baleful effects on the developing world to the megalomania of the dictatorial mind. In the third of the Rabbit books, Harry Angstrom, now 46, is reunited with his wife and dealing as best he can with the challenges and cares of midlife, when his long absent son returns and a familiar seeming young woman appears, each forcing him to confront his past anew. And in The Witches of Eastwick, Updike conjures a Rhode Island village where magic runs amok in comic and in darker veins.

THE MAN WHO LIVED UNDERGROUND

AN UNPUBLISHED NOVEL BY RICHARD WRIGHT

Fred Daniels, a Black man, is picked up by the police after a brutal double murder in a white neighborhood in an unnamed city and taken to the local precinct where he is tortured until he confesses to a crime he didn't commit. After signing a confession, he escapes from police custody and flees into the city's sewer system.

This is the devastating premise of this scorching novel—a masterpiece written in the same period as Wright's landmark books Native Son (1940) and Black Boy (1945) that he was unable to publish in his lifetime. Only small parts of it have appeared in print, and in a significantly condensed form it would eventually be included in the posthumous short story collection Eight Men (1961). Now, for the first time, this incendiary novel about race and violence in America, the work that meant more to Wright than any other ("I have never written anything in my life that stemmed more from sheer inspiration"), is published in full, in the form that he intended, complete with Wright's fascinating essay about the novel, "Memories of My Grandmother." Malcolm Wright, the author's grandson, contributes an afterword.


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JEAN STAFFORD

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For more than three decades Jean Stafford wrote masterful short fiction, perfecting a versatile style marked by acute psychological insight, an exacting eye for detail, and a bitingly satiric sensibility. Whether in Europe, New England, Colorado, or New York, her mostly female protagonists seek a sense of belonging to quell restlessness, dislocation, and isolation, conditions that Stafford knew all too well in her own life. This volume collects for the first time the complete stories of this Pulitzer Prizewinning master of the form.


"The Interior Castle" takes us inside an accident victim's physical and mental pain; "A Country Love Story" chillingly depicts marital estrangement and mental breakdown amidst the solitude of a Maine winter; "Bad Characters" is the exuberant story of a young girl led into mischief by an incorrigible friend; and "An Influx of Poets" is a haunting story of a marriage wrecked by literary ambition and egotism. The volume also includes A Mother in History, Stafford's controversial journalistic profile of Lee Harvey Oswald's mother, Marguerite, and three revealing literary essays.


The story of the Pilgrims and the *Mayflower* has been told and retold—the landing at Plymouth Rock and the first Thanksgiving, and the decades that followed as the colonists struggled to build an enduring and righteous community in the New World wilderness. But the place where the Plymouth colonists settled was no wilderness: it was Patuxet, in the ancestral homeland of the Wampanoag people, a long-inhabited region of fruitful and sustainable agriculture and well-traveled trade routes, a civilization with deep historical memories and cultural traditions.


DONALD BARTHELME

Collected Stories also includes the work that appeared for the first time in Barthelme's two retrospective anthologies, Sixty Stories and Forty Stories, as well as a selection of uncollected stories. Discover, in this comprehensive gathering, Barthelme's unique approach to fiction, his upsidedown worlds that are nonetheless grounded in fundamental human truths, his scrambled visions of history that yield unexpected insights, and his genius for dialogue, parody, and collage, which was for him "the central principle of all art in the twentieth century." Introduced with a sharp and discerning essay by editor Charles McGrath and annotation that clarifies Barthelme's freewheeling, wide-ranging allusions, this landmark volume is a desert-island edition for fans and the ideal introduction to new readers eager to find out why, as Dave Eggers writes, Barthelme's "every sentence . . . makes me want to stop and write something of my own. He fires all of my synapses and connects them in new ways."

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ELIZABETH SPENCER

Novels & Stories

Michael Gorra, editor

Elizabeth Spencer (1921–2019) was a major figure of the Southern Renaissance, though today her many books and stories are scattered or out of print. This Library of America volume brings together the very best of her writing—three novels and nineteen stories—from a career spanning more than six decades. The Voice at the Back Door (1957), greeted by The New Yorker as "a practically perfect novel," portrays small-town life in Mississippi during the late Jim Crow era and the self-interest and hatred that kept injustice firmly in place. The Light in the Piazza (1960), Spencer's most famous work, is a deftly poignant comedy about Americans abroad that was adapted to the screen by Guy Green. A second superb Italian novella, Knights and Dragons (1965), is reminiscent of Henry James's novels in its atmosphere, interiority, and concern with transplanted Americans. Spencer excelled in the short story form and this volume presents a selection by editor Michael Gorra that ranges from the early "First Dark" (1959), a kind of ghost story about a spectral oversized house in a southern town, to the valedictory "The Wedding Visitor" (2013), about the refusal to let the all-enveloping world of place, family, and childhood define one's adult life.



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
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THE SNAKE PIT

A 75TH ANNIVERSARY EDITION OF THE GROUNDBREAKING NOVEL

MARY JANE WARD

After experiencing a nervous breakdown in 1940, novelist Mary Jane Ward was misdiagnosed as schizophrenic and committed to a psychiatric hospital in New York State. From that horrific experience came this landmark novel. The Snake Pit tells the story of Virginia Cunningham, a young white middle-class woman who finds herself in a psychiatric ward with no memory of how she got there. It opens with Virginia in a highly confused state of mind, the reader initially as challenged as Virginia to make sense of her surroundings. Virginia's treatments seem a series of cruel punishments inflicted on her for crimes she cannot name, while the penalty for failing to follow the hospital's many seemingly arbitrary rules is transfer to another, even worse ward. Ward's unforgettable novel helped set in motion important investigative journalism and the introduction of legislation at the state level to reform the care and treatment of the mentally ill. Too long out of print, it belongs in the company of Sylvia Plath's The Bell Jar, Ken Kesey's One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, and Joanne Greenberg's I Never Promised You a Rose Garden—three books it influenced or inspired. This authoritative Library of America paperback includes an afterword by Ward's cousin, Larry Lockridge, a Reading Group Guide featuring additional material about Ward and the real life roots of the novel.



O. Henry, born William Sidney Porter, is best known today for his short story "The Gift of the Magi." But that legacy doesn't begin to capture the genius and the extraordinary range of a gifted humorist who deserves to be ranked among the best in our literature, alongside Ring Lardner and James Thurber. As Carl Van Doren wrote in 1917, "no writer in the language seems clever immediately after one has been reading O. Henry."

Here are 101 of O. Henry's very best short stories selected and expertly annotated by best-selling author Ben Yagoda—including not only such favorites as "The Ransom of Red Chief" and "The Last of the Troubadours" but also "The Caballero's Way," with The Cisco Kid, a murderous desperado in O. Henry's telling, and "The Cop and the Anthem." This volume presents stories from all of O. Henry's collections, including Cabbages and Kings, in which his stories set in Honduras appear—published while Porter was hiding there to escape an embezzlement indictment—as well as the most generous selection ever assembled of O. Henry's New York (which he called Baghdad-on-the-Subway) and Texas stories.. Also gathered here are previously uncollected stories, and four published here for the first time.



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BEN YAGODA recently retired after twentyfive years teaching writing and journalism at the University of Delaware. He is the author or editor of twelve books, most recently The B-Side: The Death of Tin Pan Alley and the Rebirth of the Great American Song (2015). His work has been published in The New Leader, The New York Times, Newsweek, and Rolling Stone, among other publications.
