

A novel of rare genius, *The Man with the Golden Arm* describes the dissolution of a card-dealing, recent WWII veteran named Frankie Machine. The literary critic Malcolm Cowley called *The Man with the Golden Arm* "Algren's defense of the individual," while Carl Sandburg wrote of its "strange midnight dignity." Here is a novel unlike any other, in which drug addiction, poverty, and human failure somehow suggest a defense of human dignity and a reason for hope.

This edition of one of Algren's most powerful and enduring works, winner of the first National Book Award for Fiction, features a new introduction by Algren biographer Colin Asher.

NELSON ALGREN wrote once that "literature is made upon any occasion that a challenge is put to the legal apparatus by conscience in touch with humanity." His writings always lived up to that definition. He was born on March 28, 1909, in Detroit and lived mostly in Chicago. His works include the novels *Never Come Morning* (1945) and *The Man with the Golden Arm* (1949); short story collection *The Neon Wilderness* (1946); a monumental prose-poem paean to Chicago, *Chicago: City on the Make*; and various other works of fiction and nonfiction. Algren died on May 9, 1981, within days of his appointment as a fellow of the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters

COLIN ASHER is the author of *Never a Lovely So Real* (W.W. Norton, 2019), the acclaimed 2019 biography of Nelson Algren. An instructor at CUNY, he was a 2015/2016 Fellow at the Leon Levy Center for Biography.




A cross a neutral landscape that is sometimes forbidding, a bear furiously stomps, growls, and tears at a cone that is stubbornly affixed to his head. He implores the skies and fate for relief. He is drawn to dark and wild places. At first, the depths of his sadness feel like a defeat.

Gnosspelius began these drawings as a way to make sense of how a person close to him was suffering from mental illness. The resulting book is an affecting meditation on the cold depths of depression, and then of finding glimpses of solace if not escape.

STAFFAN GNOSSPELIUS was born in Sweden and studied visual communications at Edinburgh College of Art and at Chelsea College of Art and Design in the U.K. Since 2002 he has lived in London where he is a printmaker, illustrator, and artist. In addition to *Bear*, Staffan is the author of the children's book, *Julia and the Triple C*, just released by Seven Stories' children's imprint, Triangle Square Books for Young Readers.

The legal action against Wikileaks founder Julian Assange is poised to culminate in a trial in the United States in 2023. The establishment media's coverage of Assange's extradition case has focused on his deteriorating health and what CBS News called his "secret family." Where this coverage fails to elucidate the complex issues at stake, Kevin Gosztola fills in the gaps. Based on testimony from dozens of witnesses, *Guilty of Journalism* outlines how WikiLeaks exposed the reality of American wars, the United States government's unprecedented indictment against Assange as a publisher, and the media's role in persuading the public to shoot the messenger.

KEVIN GOSZTOLA has spent the last decade reporting on Assange, WikiLeaks, and the wider war on whistleblowers. He is cofounder and managing editor of Shadowproof, an independent news outlet focused on systemic abuses of power in business and government, and the curator of The Dissenter newsletter. Gosztola also produces and co-hosts the weekly podcast, "Unauthorized Disclosure." His work has appeared in *The Nation, Salon, Common Dreams*, and *Truthout*, and he has been a featured guest on *Democracy Now!*, *The Real News Network, CounterSpin*, and *Al Jazeera English*. He is coauthor with Greg Mitchell of *Truth and Consequences: The US vs. Bradley Manning*.

RICHARD HOWARD (1929-2022) was an acclaimed translator and poet. His poetry collection *Untitled Subjects* won the 1970 Pulitzer Prize, and his translation of Baudelaire's *Fleurs du mal* won the American Book Award in 1983.

The Palestinian elections of 2006 changed modern Middle Eastern history—and challenged received notions on the question of Palestine around the world. How, Westerners asked, could a secular people elect a radical Islamist group, one that openly advocated for violent resistance against the Israeli government and its people, to lead them? With incredible detail, Caridi covers the entire history of Hamas from its 1948 origins in Islamic resistance groups through the critical 2006 elections and the 2011 revolutions that rocked the Arab world. Caridi eschews bias to instead tell the story of a movement as objectively as she can, one caught between the desire to resist its oppressor and occupier and the need to provide support for a refugee people as the sole effective government of a war-torn region embargoed by Israel.

Ten years after its publication in English, this updated version of *Hamas* provides a new chapter on recent developments in the Palestinian struggle including Israel's most recent assault on Gaza in May 2021 and a new afterword.

PAOLA CARIDI is a founding member of the News Agency, Lettera22, for which she worked as a reporter and political analyst in Jerusalem for ten years. Currently, she is a lecturer of International Relations at the University of Palermo. In addition to this, she is also a member of the Istituto Affari Internazionali (IAI), an Italian think tank on international relations. Her first book, *Arabi Invisibili* was published in 2007 by Feltrinelli. *Hamas* is her first book translated into English. She lives in Sicily.



He is also the director of the acclaimed Semana Negra de Gijón, a literary festival in Spain.





In Moon and the Mars, set in the impoverished Five Points district of New York City in the years leading up to and during the Civil War, we experience neighborhood life through the eyes of a young girl named Theo. We follow her from childhood to adolescence, as a mixed-race orphan living between the homes of her Black and Irish grandmothers. Theo witnesses everything from the creation of tap dance to P.T. Barnum's sensationalist museum, from the Civil War being about secession versus the Union to Black soldiers being a key part of the Union victory and the war being about emancipation, as white America's attitudes towards race, people of color, and humanity are shifting—painfully, tragically, transformationally.





Telson Algren's acclaimed 1947 short story collection is the pure vein that he mined for the rest of his long career. This was where he honed the style and approach—"American realism touched with poetry" that he would use so effectively across many volumes in the decades to come. These stories are literary triumphs in their own right, and contain the seeds for several of his novels. The story "A Bottle of Milk for Mother," about a Chicago youth accused of murder, is the narrative engine of Never Come Morning. And Railroad Shorty in "The Face on the Barrom Floor," in which a legless man pummels another man nearly to death, becomes Legless Schmidt in A Walk on the Wild Side. For his wry humor, and the natural respect he finds in himself for the small-time hoods, boxers, prostitutes, junkies and street kids who meant so much to him, Algren set a new standard for American literature. This redesigned edition includes the Paris Review interview with Nelson Algren by Alston Anderson and Terry Southern, an afterword by Studs Terkel, an introduction by Tom Carson, and a new foreword by Algren biographer Colin Asher.

NELSON ALGREN wrote once that "literature is made upon any occasion that a challenge is put to the legal apparatus by conscience in touch with humanity." His writings always lived up to that definition. He was born on March 28, 1909, in Detroit and lived mostly in Chicago. His works include, among many others, the novels *Never Come Morning* (1945), and *The Man with the Golden Arm* (1949), winner of the first National Book Award for Fiction, the classic short story collection *The Neon Wilderness* (1947), the epic prose-poem paean to Chicago, *Chicago: City on the* Make, and a wide range of other works of fiction and reportage. Algren died on May 9, 1981, within days of his appointment as a fellow of the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters

STUDS TERKEL was an American author, historian, and journalist best known for his oral histories, which vividly captured American life in the twentieth century. In 1985 he won the Pulitzer Prize for nonfiction for his book *The Good War: An Oral History of World War II.* COLIN ASHER is the author of *Never a Lovely So Real* (W.W. Norton, 2019), the definitive biography of Nelson Algren. An instructor at CUNY, he was a 2015/2016 Fellow at the Leon Levy Center for Biography. TOM CARSON is an American novelist and journalist who wrote about Algren in the *Village Voice*.

After the war, he was granted a classical scholarship at Oxford and subsequently went to Egypt as the first professor of English at the University of Cairo. Among his most popular books are *I Claudius*, about the Roman emperor Claudius, and his works on mythology, including *The White Goddess*. His *The Reader Over Your Shoulder*, written with Alan Hodge, is considered to be one of the best books ever written about the English language.

MADISON SMARTT BELL is an American writer who has written thirteen novels, and multiple biography and nonfiction works. He is known for *All Soul's Rising*, a novel which was a finalist for the 1995 National Book Award and is the first in his acclaimed trilogy about the Haitian Revolution. Madison is a professor of English at Goucher College.

ALISON L. STRAYER is a Canadian writer and translator Her work has been shortlisted for the Governor General's Award for Literature and for Translation, the Grand Prix du livre de Montreal, and the Prix litteraire France-Quebec. She lives in Paris.





Most importantly, this edition helps endow readers with the critical media literacy skills required to hold power to account for distorting or censoring news coverage.

MICKEY HUFF is the director of Project Censored and president of the nonprofit Media Freedom Foundation. Since 2009, he has coedited the Project Censored yearbook. He is also coauthor of *United States of Distraction* (City Lights, 2019) and *Let's Agree to Disagree* (Routledge, 2022).

ANDY LEE ROTH is the associate director of Project Censored and coordinator of the Project's Campus Affiliates program. His work has appeared in *YES! Magazine*, In *These Times*, and scholarly journals.

The Ukraine

ARTEM CHAPEYE

TRANSLATED BY ZENIA H. TOMPKINS

The Ukraine is a collection of twenty-six pieces that deliberately blur the line between nonfiction and fiction, conjuring the essence of a beloved country through its tastes, smells, and sounds, its small towns and big cities, its people and their compassion and indifference, simplicities and complications.

In the title story, Chapeye playfully embraces the English misuse of the article "the" in reference to Ukraine, capturing a country as perceived from the outside, by foreigners. That pseudo-kitsch, often historically shallow, and not-quite-real Ukraine resonates because of its highly engaging and brutally candid snapshots of ordinary lives and typical places. In "One Soul per Home" an elderly woman laments that the men are dying and the young are leaving for the cities, changing the face of her small town; in "The Unscrupulous Spirit of the Provinces," a couple of unspecified gender get stoned and go to church; and in "False Premises," a man romanticizes his younger years working for a Soviet fishing fleet only to reconstruct his nostalgia in the face of Putin's Russia.

An author of both creative nonfiction and popular fiction, **ARTEM CHAPEYE** was born and raised in the small Western Ukrainian city of Kolomyia and has spent much of the last twenty years living in Kyiv. He has authored two novels and four books of creative nonfiction, and is a co-author of a book of war reportage. On March 28, 2022 the *New Yorker* published the title story of this collection, accompanied by an interview with Chapeye, making him one of the first Ukrainian voices from the conflict to be featured in American media after the war began. A four-time finalist of the BBC Book of the Year Award, his recent collection *The Ukraine* was one of three finalists in the award's new nonfiction category in 2018.

ZENIA H. TOMPKINS is a translator of Ukranian fiction, nonfiction and children's books, and founder of the Tompkins Agency for Ukranian Literature in Translation (TAULT, tault.org).



Although she is immobilized, her mind reels, moving through time, her memories a salve and a burden. A son is stuck in a body that he doesn't feel is his own. He endures misperceptions and abuse on the way to becoming who he truly is. A mother who grew up being told she was never good enough, in a world with no place for the desires and choices of women. She carries with her the burden of generations. These three stories run parallel and intertwine. Three voices deepen and give perspective to one another's truth, pain, and struggle to survive.

IVANA BODROŽIĆ was born in Vukovar, Croatia, in 1982, where she lived until the Yugoslav Wars started in 1991. That year her father disappeared while fighting for Croatian independence and she and the rest of her family moved to a refugee hotel in Kumrovec. In 2005, she published her first poetry collection, The First Step into Darkness, and in 2010 her acclaimed and bestselling first novel The Hotel Tito, which won three major awards in Croatia and the Prix Ulysse for Best Debut Novel in France. It was published by Seven Stories in 2017. Since then Bodrozic released her second poetry collection, A Crossing for Wild Animals, and a short story collection, 100% Cotton. We Trade Our Night for Someone Else's Day, published by Seven Stories in 2021, is her second novel and her first political thriller. Sons, Daughters, Bodrožić's third novel, marks another step in a new direction.

ELLEN ELIAS-BURSAC translates fiction and nonfiction from Bosnian, Croatian, and Serbian. She has taught in the Harvard University Slavic Department and is a contributing editor to *Asymptote*. Her most recent translation for Seven Stories is Robert Perisic's novel *No-Signal Area*. She lives in Boston.

ERNESTO CHE GUEVARA was born in Argentina and became a central leader of the Cuban Revolution. He was killed on a guerrilla mission in Bolivia in 1967.

ADRIENNE RICH (1929-2012) was one of America's greatest and most radical poets.

he wrote this biographical introduction to Marx and Engels after his 1965 mission to Africa. He studied the writing of the German revolutionary philosophers intensely, and during his travels he immersed himself in the classic works of Marxism. He sought to draw lessons and inspiration from Marx and Engels, and noted: "The Cuban Revolution takes up Marx at the point where he put aside science to pick up his revolutionary rifle." With Che's tremendous grasp of theory combined with his own experiences as a revolutionary, he observes Marx's evolution through the prism of his own view of radical change as he experienced it in Cuba, and considers how it might apply to other countries after they achieve their definitive liberation from colonialism. 

Roque Dalton, one of Latin America's greatest poets, was a revolutionary whose politics were inseparable from his art. Born in El Salvador in 1935, Dalton dedicated his life to fighting for social justice, and to writing fierce, tender poems about his country and its people. In *Stories and Poems of a Class Struggle*, he explores oppression and resistance through the lens of five poetic personas, each with their own distinct voice. In striking, immediate, inventive language, Dalton captures the ethos of a people, as stirring now as it was when the book was first published forty years ago. "I believe the world is beautiful," he writes, "and that poetry, like bread, is for everyone."

ROQUE DALTON (1935–1975) was a poet, essayist, intellectual, and revolutionary. His brilliant combination of politics and art permanently changed the landscape of Latin American literature. The author of eighteen volumes of poetry and prose, one of which (*Taberna y otros lugares*) received a Casa de las Américas prize in 1967, his work combines fierce satirical irony with a humane and exuberant tenderness. His legacy extends beyond his achievements as a poet to his political writings and political work in his native El Salvador.

JACK HIRSCHMAN (1933-2021) was a poet, translator, and activist. Among his collections of poetry is *All That's Left* (City Lights Books, 2008). He taught at UCLA and was previously the poet laureate of San Francisco.





Mientras vivía en Guatemala en 1954—entonces bajo el gobierno electo de Jacobo Árbenz—se involucro en la actividad política ahí y presencio el derrocamiento de ese gobierno por una operación militar organizada por la CIA. Luego de la victoria de los rebeldes el 1 de enero de 1959, Guevara se convertío en líder principal del nuevo gobierno revolucionario. En septiembre de 1959 fue nombrado director del Departamento de Industrialización del Instituto Nacional de Reforma.

n September 11, 1973, in Santiago de Chile, Augusto Pinochet took power and installed a dictatorship in place of the democratic government of President Salvador Allende. 





His designs and illustrations have reinvented posters, record covers, ads, animated films, and logos, and have been exhibited in galleries and museums all over the world, including MoMA and the Cooper Hewitt, Smithsonian Design Museum. He is the author of over thirty books for children, including, most recently, Arno and the MiniMachine (Triangle Square), The Pancake King (Princeton Architectural Press), four graphic novels, and several typefaces, and has twice been named by the New York Times as among the best illustrators of the year. Chwast is the recipient of the AIGA Medal. He lives in New York City with his wife, the artist and graphic designer Paula Scher.



Refusing to become the stereotype of femininity, she dreams of another world, where she can breathe, uncorseted, away from the strictures of social expectation. She ignores the slander and rumors that follow her, and builds a free woman's life, deeply respected by friends and contemporaries like Victor Hugo, Honoré de Balzac, Gustave Flaubert and many others. Using her fame as a writer, she fights for women's and workers' rights. She is the model of an emancipated woman.



The Outcast Thinker

DEVRA LEHMANN

A brilliant schoolboy in seventeenth-century Amsterdam, Bento Spinoza—formally Baruch and later Benedict de Spinoza—quickly learns to keep his ideas to himself. When he is twenty-three, those ideas prove so scandalous to his own Jewish community that he is cast out, cursed, and effectively erased from their communal life. The scandal shows no sign of waning as his ideas spread throughout Europe. At the center of the storm, he lives the simplest of lives, quietly devoted to his work as a lens grinder and to his steadfast search for truth, striving to embody a philosophy of tolerance and benevolence. Spinoza does not live to see his ideas change the world.

What caused such an uproar? Spinoza challenged ageold ideas about God, the Bible, and religion. His God was the sum total of nature, not a father-figure who created the world and takes care of humankind. His bible was a book like any other, not a holy text to be interpreted only by religious authorities. His religion was a commitment to basic moral behavior, not a collection of superstitions or rituals. For such ideas, Spinoza was reviled, but he emerged from his experience as one of history's most articulate voices for freedom of thought, freedom of expression, and freedom of religion. Those of us who enjoy the fundamental rights of modern democracies are the beneficiaries of Spinoza's quiet bravery.

DEVRA LEHMANN is the author of *Socrates: A Life Worth Living* and *Spinoza: The Outcast Thinker*, which won the 2014 National Jewish Book Award for Children's and Young Adult Literature. In her thirty-five years in the classroom, she has taught preschoolers to sound out monosyllables, high schoolers to read Shakespeare, and adults to parse Talmudic passages. She is now at work on a young adult biography of Augustine of Hippo.



A imé Césaire was a poet and, later, a politician from the Caribbean island of Martinique, who spoke out against the sufferings and humiliations endured by the peoples of the former French colonies. In Aimé Césaire: No to Humiliation, we are with Césaire in 1930s Paris. The young Martinican poet and his friends Léopold Sédar Senghor and Léon-Gontran Damas are launching the Negritude movement. Together, they celebrate their Black African roots, protesting French colonial rule and policies of assimilation. They invite West Indians, Senegalese, Guyanese, and others to reject the suffocating French colonial presence and to take pride in their accents, their cultures and their shared histories.


Aimé's great book-length poem, *Notebook of a Return to the Native Land*, and other works are a global inspiration. His speeches enliven the crowds back home in Martinique, and he rises in the political arena, defending Martinican identity. As a writer, as the Mayor of Fort-de-France and deputy of the French National Congress, Aimé Césaire continues to write and to fight against colonial power and for the dignity of Black peoples everywhere.

Born in 1959 in Chad, **NIMROD** is a poet, philosopher, novelist, essayist, and journalist. Nimrod received the Vocation Prize, the Louise Labé Prize and the Thyde Monnier de la Société des Gens de Lettres and is the author of several novels and an essay collection in French.

EMMA RAMADAN is a literary translator from French into English. She's the recipient of an NEA fellowship, a Fulbright grant, and the 2018 Albertine Prize. Among her translations are Anne Garréta's *Sphinx* and *Not One Day*, Virginie Despentes's *Pretty Things*, and Abdellah Taïa's *A Country for Dying* (Seven Stories Press), for which she won the 2021 PEN Translation Prize.



JOSÉ DE SOUSA SARAMAGO (November 1922-June 2010) was a Portuguese writer and recipient of the 1998 Nobel Prize in Literature. His international breakthrough came with the novel Baltasar and Blimunda (italicize title), published in 1982. Saramago was an atheist and a member of the Portuguese Communist. His writings, which often employ allegorial renderings of historical events, were controversial in his native country. Saramago's work has been translated into over 25 languages and he remains one of the most important international writers of the past century.

MARGARET JULL COSTA is a translator of Portuguese and Spanish fiction and poetry, including the works of José Saramago, Eça de Queiroz, Fernando Pessoa, Paulo Coelho, Bernardo Atxaga, Carmen Martín Gaite, Javier Marías, Ángela Vallvey, and Luisa Valenzuela. Her translations have been awarded the International Dublin Literary Award, the Oxford-Weidenfeld Translation Prize (four times), and the TLS Translation Prize, among many others.

YOLANDA MOSQUERA lives and works in the north of Spain, in the Basque Country. She is a graphic designer and illustrator and has taught illustration and creativity workshops. In 2014, she received an honorable mention in the third edition of the Sharjah Children's Book Illustrations Exhibition in the United Arab Emirates and the Euskadi Prize for Literature Illustration in 2018.





No to Borders

nosa Luxemburg was a Polish-born German rev-Nolutionary emboldened by the necessity of acting against imperialism, colonialism, and militarism. When she was jailed in 1914 for her anti-war speeches, she continued to speak against World War I by writing pamphlets published under a pseudonym. And after her release from prison she continued campaigning for her political causes, cofounding the Communist Party of Germany. Luxemburg was assassinated by the German Freikorps (paramilitary unit), who were sent by the Chancellor to destroy the left-wing revolt. On the night before her death, Luxemburg wrote about her belief in the masses and the "inevitability of a triumphant revolution." After her death, Lenin praised her, calling her "an eagle of the working class," and her writings and commitment to democracy and internationalism live on.

ANNE BLANCHARD is the author of L'encyclopédie des rebelles, insoumis et autres révolutionnaires, in which she tells the life of great figures who wanted to change the world, and of L'encyclopédie des héros, icônes et autres demi-dieux. But she has a special tenderness for Rosa Luxemburg, a woman who put her whole life at the service of a cause she thought was just. With Rosa Luxemburg she pays homage to what she admires the most: the total commitment of an entire existence, whatever the personal cost.

ROSIE EYRE is a literary translator from French and Spanish based in northwest England. Educated at the University of Cambridge and at the University of Manchester, her previous translations include *Caring in Times of Covid-19* by Spanish photojournalist Juan Zarza, 100 First Words for Toddlers, and the dystopian novel Survivor by Julie Guinand.




WILLIAM LOREN KATZ (1927-2019) was born in Brooklyn and grew up in Greenwich Village in a progressive family dedicated to social justice. After serving in World War II and attending college on the GI Bill, he became a teacher in New York for many years. The author of more than forty books, many for younger readers, he documented the often overlooked contributions of Black and Indigenous people through history. Through his scholarship and educational outreach, he helped to refashion social studies curriculums across the country, encouraging the histories of minorities and women to be part of US history courses rather than siloed into their own fields of study. In one of his best-known books, Black Indians, he wrote, "I have been humbled by the awesome task of rejecting bias. I have never sought bland neutrality and have consoled myself that unbiased history has yet to be written."

ROBIN D. G. KELLEY is Distinguished Professor and Gary B. Nash Endowed Chair in US History at UCLA. He is the author of many books including Africa Speaks, America Answers: Modern Jazz in Revolutionary Times, and Thelonious Monk: The Life and Times of an American Original.

Korczak was the pen name of Polish doctor Henry Goldszmit, an author of books for and about children, and, most famously, the director of a Warsaw orphanage, which he called a "republic of children," where their rights, their voices, fairness, and respect were paramount. Though some were very young, the children had a parliament, a newspaper, and a court with which to learn participation in citizenry and communal responsibility and care. When the Nazis invaded Poland, Korczak was given the opportunity by the authorities to escape before his charges were sent to the camps. After surviving the deprivations of the Warsaw ghetto together, he accompanied the children to Treblinka where it is assumed they all perished.

ISABELLE COLLOMBAT is a journalist by training. She tells the story of today's world through documentaries and novels aimed at young people. She often mixes in her books individual destinies and great movements of History. At Actes Sud Junior, she published the documentary album *Heroes for the Earth* and historical novels in the They Said No series—*Janusz Korczak: No to Denying the Rights of Children, Chico Mendes: No to Deforestation*, and *Rachel Carson: No to the Destruction of Nature*.

ROSIE EYRE is a literary translator from French and Spanish based in northwest England. Educated at the University of Cambridge and the University of Manchester, her previous translations include *Caring in Times of Covid-19* (2020) by Spanish photojournalist Juan Zarza, 100 First Words for Toddlers (Rockwell Press, 2021), and the dystopian novel Survivor by Julie Guinand (Strangers Press, 2022).
