• American Jewish identity is in unprecedented crisis:

- The century that defined American Jewish life as we know it is over. Leifer traces how the pillars of the postwar Jewish consensus—Americanism, Zionism, and liberalism—emerged and why we are witnessing them falter today. Leifer provides an unparalleled look at the contemporary Jewish landscape, illuminating the attempts by American Jews to build new forms of community and shared identity as the generation of Holocaust survivors passes away and Israel increasingly becomes a source of communal division.

These events have dramatically reconfigured how many American Jews understand their place in this country, their relationship to whiteness, and their connections to other historically marginalized people.
- Extensive reporting with exceptional range and unique access: This book is the product of in-depth reporting conducted in the United States and Israel/Palestine. It is informed by nearly 100 interviews with Jewish communal leaders, educators, racial justice and Palestine Solidarity activists, LGBTQ+ rabbis, ultra-Orthodox machers and education reformers, journalists, diplomats, and Israeli politicians.

JOSHUA LEIFER is a journalist, editor, and translator. His essays and reporting have appeared widely in international publications, including *The New York Review of Books, The New York Times, The Guardian, The New Statesman, Haaretz, The Nation,* and elsewhere. A member of the *Dissent* editorial board, he previously worked as an editor at *Jewish Currents* and at +972 Magazine. He is currently pursuing a PhD at Yale University, where his research focuses on the history of modern moral and social thought.
