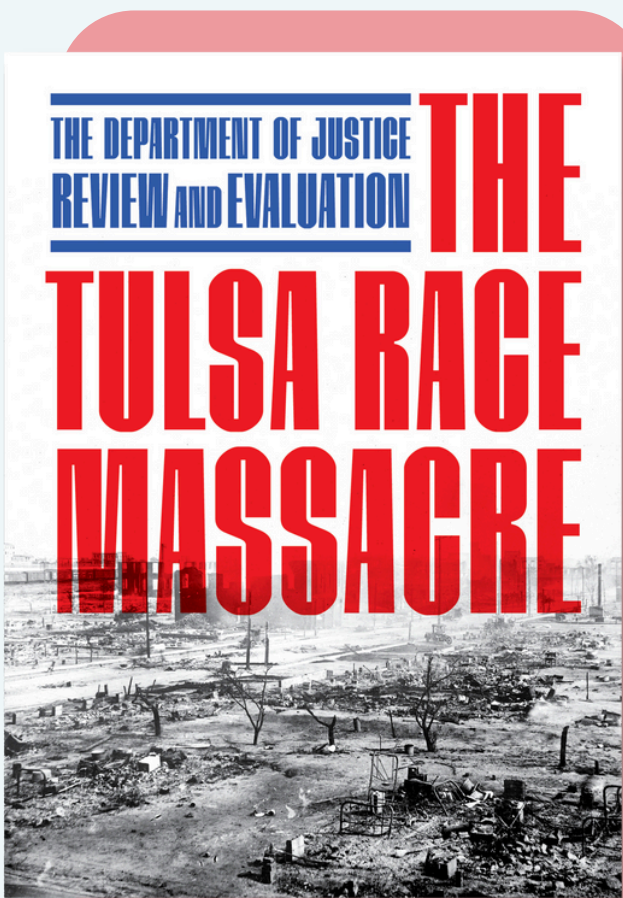


Just days after this report was released, the Trump administration froze the office that issued it – the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice.
