But how does Gertie feel about sharing Mummy? Is there enough room in Mummy's heart to love both Gertie AND the new arrival?



Christmas in the Trenches

John McCutcheon, Henri Sorensen

Summary

A story of the WWI unofficial Christmas Truce when the spirit of Christmas propelled the German and British soldiers lining the trenches on both sides of No Man's Land to briefly choose peace. Based on actual events.

WWI began in August of 1914, sending the Allies into battle against a German aggressor. Many people thought it would be a brief war, resolved by Christmas. But this was not to be—the war stretched to 1918.

As the first Christmas of the war approached, troops were dug into muddy trenches on the Western Front with British troops facing their German counterparts, some as few as fifty yards away. The German Kaiser had sent small Christmas trees with candles to the front to cheer the enlisted men, while British families sent gifts of food and clothing to their fathers and brothers and sons praying for their safe return. These were the conditions as Christmas eve approached.

John McCutcheon's haunting story is based on the event known as the unofficial Christmas Truce and on a song that he composed and recorded. John creates a British soldier, Francis Tolliver, who recounts that Christmas eve night to his grandchildren when they ask if he was a hero in the war.

In this story-within-a-story, Tolliver tells of hearing singing coming from the German side, a Christmas carol. The British troops in turn sing "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen." And soon both sides are singing "Silent Night/Stille Nacht" in English and German. What follows surprises us, and we glimpse the power of peace. It takes one brave person to step forward and make a meaningful human connection possible.

A QR code connects readers to McCutcheon's song and his rendition of "Silent Night/Stille Nacht." An Author's Note and historical note provide additional information about the event and John's inspiration for the song. Henri Sørensen's full-color oil paintings reinforce the emotional power and dignity of the story.
