Solitaria is the story of two Black women, Eunice and Mabel, a mother and a daughter working as criminally underpaid live-in maids to a wealthy family in a large, contemporary Brazilian city. They take turns recounting their lives through the prisms of the hidden rooms they inhabit, from which a portrait of a shocking crime emerges, raising questions of loyalty, care, and the possibility of liberation in colonialism's long shadow.


We remain entirely blown away by everything that *Solitaria* achieves—its innovative use of architecture as a narrative structure, its polyphonic anatomy, its supple, kinaesthetic prose, and its rigorous internationalist portrait of race, class, gender, and the care economy. Its formal ambition and acuity is unlike anything else we've encountered in fiction. We believe that *Solitaria* is destined to be a modern classic; it's a literary masterpiece and a globally, perennially resonant social critique.

We're humbled to be publishing *Solitaria* with the words of renowned Canadian poet Dionne Brand and acclaimed public intellectual Saidiya Hartman on its back. Brand notes the novel's "rare alchemy", while Hartman calls the novel "a gem". Eliana Alves Cruz has a massive public following in Brazil, where she has countless beloved fans, and we are incredibly honored to be finally bringing her work to an American readership.

There are crucial pairs at work in *Solitaria*. There is Eliana's tremendous narrative feat and Benjamin Brooks' lucid, propulsive translation, and there is mother and daughter—each with their deep wellsprings of wisdom, their mighty convictions, their tender and robust hearts. So when we first encountered the novel, falling in love with it simultaneously, we felt it fitting to take it on as an editorial pair, to send it into the world jointly as our first publication at Astra.
